Visit of Casa Scalabrini Project

Since 2004, ASCS has been working alongside migrants, refugees and local communities in Europe and Africa. They operate in three main areas of intervention, that include projects and activities in hospitality, awareness raising and development cooperation. The Projects promotes the culture of welcome, encounter and integration between migrants, refugees and the local community. In Casa Scalabrini are hosted thirty people including families and refugee youth in semi-autonomy. They also

promote activities and trainings open to all, and organize moments of meeting, dialogue and celebration.

Visit and lunch at Borgo Laudato Si', Castel Gandolfo

Thanks to the creation of the «Borgo Laudato si'» project, the beauty of the Pontifical Villas' Gardens has become the natural setting for the development of a place, open to all people of good will, to be trained in integral ecology. The project has been developed in three directions: integral ecology education, circular and generative economy, and environmental sustainability. People visiting the Borgo Laudato Si' have a chance to experience at once centuries of history, unique natural wonders and immersion into integral ecology. In fact, full-immersion tour is provided, to give visitors an opportunity to get to know the principles of the Encyclical Letter Laudato Si', experiencing first-hand their application in the local territory, thus gaining an existential awareness that might foster in them a real ecological conversion.
